



The Applicant's FIRST and LAST names in the Sponsorship record MUST match the names on the identity documents provided by the Applicant during Enrollment. Any mismatch means the Applicant must return to the Sponsor to have the Sponsorship information corrected before scheduling a new Registration appointment. The only exceptions to this rule are shown in the tables below.

### Allowable Exceptions to the Mismatch Rule

Some examples of mismatches that would require a correction to the Sponsorship record are given here. This is not a complete list:

- Apparent typo or transposition of letters in the name (Example: "Jhon" instead of "John", or "Smyth" shown in one place while "Smith" is shown in the other)
- Mismatch between a given name and an alias, nickname, or derivative name (Example: "Jim" is used in one place while "James" is used in the other)
- First and middle name swapped or first name dropped in preference to middle name (Example: Sponsorship record shows "Scott Smith" while the identity document shows "Eldon S. Smith")
- Mismatch between maiden name in one record and married name in the other (Example: "Jane R. Doe" vs. "Jane D. Smith")
- Mismatch of suffix (Jr., Sr., III) (Example: Sponsorship record shows "Tom Smith Jr." while identity document shows "Tom Smith")



**Linking Documents**

The only time identity source documents with different names can be accepted is when an official linking document such as a marriage certificate, certified copy of birth certificate, or court record can be provided linking the name on the source document to the name in the sponsorship record.

The linking document must have both the former and current legal names on it and both the primary and secondary documents must be valid and not expired, with the exception of a US Passport.

For example, a married woman may use both a current driver's license, with her married name, and a certified copy of her birth certificate, with her maiden name, as primary and secondary sources of identification as long as she brings a linking document, her marriage license, with both her maiden name and married name on it .

When a linking document is presented, you must scan the document into the Document 3 window.

**Enrollment Procedure for Name Mismatch**

First and last names on identification documents MUST match the first and last names entered in the Sponsorship record. If the names do not match, the Applicant must either return to enrollment with documents that match the names in the Sponsorship record, or contact the Sponsor to have their name corrected in the Sponsorship record. The only time identity source documents with different names can be accepted is when an official linking document such as a marriage certificate, certified copy of birth certificate, or court record can be provided linking the name on the source document to the name in the sponsorship record.

If the FIRST and LAST names match, but the MIDDLE names do not match, the Registrar should enroll the applicant and flag the record for more validation required.

Enroll Applicant and Flag Record for More Validation

If the FIRST and LAST names match, but the MIDDLE names do not match and there is a story and a linking document that substantiates the difference, the Registrar can enroll the person without flagging the record.

	Government Agency ID: Mary Smith (No Middle Name)
	Mary is from Texas where the maiden name is entered on women's Driver's Licenses in place of the middle name. Mary says Blakely is her maiden name.
